
Groups take on Repairs and Improvements

You all obviously have your own pictures like this, it would be great to see some of them.



60 Years of Service

The District Commissioner, Lesley Rutter, presented Bert Trattell with his 60 Years Service Award on the 13th August. However, Bert still has a few more Awards to go as 'Compass' hasn't caught up with his record yet!!!

Bert joined the Scout movement in about 1936 and eventually became a Scout and then a Rover Scout with the 13th Lewisham South Group.

He was conscripted into the army in 1944 taking part in the fighting through Belgium and Germany. As part of the occupying forces in Berlin he met up with a like minded number of 'Scouts' in the army units and together they founded an Army Rover Scout Troup. They even managed to put on a Gang Show for their units! A home-made '78 - Bakelite' record still exists of part of the show, even after 60 years! (Now on a CD).

After Bert was 'demobbed' he was Warranted as a Senior Scout Leader with the 12th Lewisham Group and remained with them until 1962 when he joined the 6th Sevenoaks (Kemsing) as a Scout Leader. In 1975, Bert was appointed GSL to the 6th and remained in that post until he retired (compulsory then) in 1991.

In recognition of his long Service to Scouting, Bert was awarded the Silver Acorn in 1989.

Even in retirement Bert continued to help Scouting, working via the Fellowship and more latterly through Active Support. Well done Bert, I wonder how many young people have been guided through their Scouting achievements by you. When will we see your 70th and 80th Badges?

Have you heard of the Scouts of the World Award?


Well probably not but don't feel bad as it's not one that most of us are aware of although it would seem not Nigel Burgin who spent time over the summer working on it.
