The museum is situated just along from the Woolwich Ferry and a mile and half from the Thames Barrier. The whole area has been redeveloped over the past few years, it will soon have a station on the Cross Rail line and is well worth a visit.

Of course no Active Support outing would be complete without food and we all gathered in the Firepower Café for lunch.

Whilst in FIREPOWER Ken came across a canon which was built in Mafeking railway yards during the siege from bits and pieces of old machinery. The Gun was named after BP whose nickname you may recall was Wolf. Ken recognised the gun as he had recently given a Talk about it to a group of friends.

## 'Wolf', British, dated 1900

At the Siege of Mafeking during the Boer war, the British were very short of artillery and needed a gun that could hit back at the surrounding Boers. This gun was manufactured in workshops in Mafeking by James Connelly under the supervision of Major Panzera. It was made out of spare metal parts and the wheels were originally from a threshing machine. The British named it 'Wolf' after Colonel Baden-Powell, who was present during the siege (it was his nickname) and used it to bombard Boer positions.

Later a group of us attempted to walk to the Thames Barrier but being the good scouts that we surely are we missed a rather important sign that should have diverted us around a housing estate and so we actually only got to within ¼ mile of our goal.

What we did discover was that although we knew of a foot tunnel below the Thames existed at Greenwich we didn't know of a second one next to the Ferry terminal at Woolwich. Could be useful for a bizarre circular walk.
